200 YEARS OF SERVICE AT LOYOLA

At the closing Mass on May 31st, we had the honour of celebrating the dedication, loyalty, and long-term commitment of five retirees who - all combined - have served Loyola for an astounding 200 years!

The five retirees are: Mr. Jim Pearson '49 (after 62 years at Loyola); Fr. Gerry Mathieu, S.J. '52 (after 52 years), Mr. Kelly Burke (after 33 years), Mr. Mark Bednarczyk '64 (after 32 years); and, Mr. John Pasquini (after 21 years).

Mr. James (Jim) Pearson '49 began his teaching career at Loyola in 1956 when he joined the Math Department. He was department head and wrote textbooks with two of his colleagues, Doug Potvin and Fred Bedford. In 1980, he and colleague Ed Meagher began the Loyola High School Foundation. In 1990, Jim and his wife Joan were inducted into the Loyola Hall of Merit. He retired from teaching in 1996 but continued his work with the Foundation. Mr. Pearson has been the longest-serving educator in the school's history!

Fr. Gerald (Gerry) Mathieu '52 joined the Loyola family in the fall of 1966. In his fifty-two years at the school, Fr. Mathieu has been a teacher, a counsellor, a coach, and a moderator. Every year, for 50 years, he encouraged homeroom teachers and their students to hold fundraisers for the Christmas Basket drive. Both the teachers and the students took his encouragement to heart, raising approximately \$20,000 annually.

Mr. Kelly Burke arrived at Loyola in 1985 and it did not take him long to establish himself as an excellent teacher, as well as a talented basketball and volleyball coach. He was the moderator of the Grad Ski Trip (a graduating class highlight) and the Director of the Summer School. Mr. Burke has served the Loyola community as the Director of Student Services and as Vice-Principal of Discipline.

Mr. Mark Bednarczyk '64 has worn a plethora of hats over his 32 years at Loyola, from beloved English teacher, to impassioned drama instructor, to poised department head, to seasoned play director, to dedicated Vice-Principal, to devoted academic advisor, to committed school trip chaperone, to skilled in-house editor, and the lengthy list goes on.

Mr. John Pasquini joined the school in 1997 to continue developing Loyola's music programme. We could not resist sharing a part of Mark Bednarczyk's "punny" tribute to him: "His was a well-orchestrated entry to the hallowed halls of Loyola. His appearance at that time was noteworthy because it marked the beginning of the band program (...) Mr. Pasquini's arrival was an overture of things to come. Thus, Mr. Pasquini, who would be instrumental in establishing the programme, was accorded a warm welcome. He immediately became a well-liked, upbeat member of the staff. The tenor of his discussions was seen by all, as a step in the right direction. He never missed a beat when discussing his love of music."

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

ach year at convocation, the president is asked to provide a "school report" on the success of the year. I have now made three such reports and have listened to several dozen throughout my time at Loyola. I have to admit that I have never really found these reports very interesting. That may seem odd coming from someone who dearly loves the school and who is now responsible for presenting these reports. I'm always proud of the accomplishments of our students and staff and reporting on them is not a difficult task. The number of championships, award winners, the various statistics on our fund raising activities or the 100% success rate that our students had in being accepted into the post-secondary program of their choice are indeed impressive and do speak to the quality of our students and programs, but these sorts of things always seemed to me to fall short of being a "report" on the year. Surely there is more to the Loyola experience than this kind of information can convey. If I were the president of a different kind of company - say one that produced and sold widgets - I imagine that a year-end report would include something about how many widgets we sold. This seems clear, as that is the purpose of the company. If the year-end report simply indicated a new supplier with whom we were particularly happy, or our excitement about our new widget making equipment it would feel like I somehow missed the point because those things are just the means to an end.

Similarly, the sports and activities, the academic achievements and the fundraising are not the purpose of Loyola, they are just the means. Loyola is not about "producing"



championships or awards, it is about forming young men who will make a difference in the world – men of competence, commitment, compassion and conscience. So the year-end report is really written on the hearts and minds of the young graduates and the reports from the many years of Loyola's history are really seen in your lives, the lives of our alumni.

I was recently at a 55th reunion dinner for the class of 1963. It was really inspiring to hear the stories of the many alumni from that year who have given so much of themselves to better the world. Four of them are recipients of the Order of Canada for philanthropic work, one is a Jesuit who has given his whole life in service of the marginalized and many, many others have been using their gifts and talents in service of others. So what will our graduates be doing with the gifts they have received? Only time will tell but in conferring a Loyola diploma we are expressing our confidence and hope in these young men who are heading out into the world. Perhaps they will be the ones with the inspiring stories in 2073.

FALL SPORT SEASON IS ALIVE AND WELL AT LOYOLA

As the school year gets underway, so does the fall sports season. Once again, Loyola boasts an impressive number of student athletes. Interscholastic sports continues to be an important part of the school's tradition. Currently Loyola has 11 teams competing in football, soccer, volleyball, cross-country running and golf. In addition, the school offers an impressive fall intramural program, with both football for the Junior school and soccer for the Senior school. In total, 316 student athletes are representing Loyola on the fields, courts, trails and courses around the city.

PRINCIPAL'S CORNER

At "back to school" time, principals typically reflect on the previous school year, review enrollment numbers, plan opening teacher meetings, and meet with

other administrators to set goals. This past year, Loyola's student body on the whole performed very well, keeping our retention numbers strong. And so, as I reflect on how this was accomplished, and gear up with our team for the new school year, the common thread, for me, the thing I keep being drawn back to, is the incredible talent and commitment that our staff bring to bear on their work with our students. After all these years, Loyola's program is still demanding, make no mistake, but what I see from my vantage point, after one year on the job as principal, is a staff that demonstrates the energy, know-how, care, and resolve to work with our students so that they reach and surpass our high expectations. The quality of instruction is absolutely there, but what I would like to highlight at this particular point are the different supports our staff provide so that our students can succeed. As I look at our strong student retention from last year, I realize the incredible work that our staff and students have done. It starts with excellent instruction in the classroom, the backbone of our mission, and certainly

very hard work by our students themselves. All teachers host office hours and give extra help tutorials as well. And from there, providing that extra bit of critical support, our student advisors, guidance counselors, and academic vice principals pick up the ball and run with it, so to speak. They work tirelessly with our students to meet individual learning needs and to remove any blocks to progress. In some cases, our students may need to take advantage of Loyola's strong After School Program or to enroll in Summer School. Faculty who lead and staff these programs often give their time and energy when they could be off-duty, so that our students can move forward with their education. Loyola teachers do so in thoughtful, patient, professional, and kind ways that I have honestly found inspiring to witness. It all boils down to cura personalis, care for the whole person, an aspect of our Jesuit mission that our staff understand and commit to from the start of their work here. It is a value they customize for each student, to support his growth toward achieving his true potential and developing his unique gifts. Instructing, motivating, guiding and challenging each student, holding him accountable for his best work, is a purpose our teachers take seriously and fulfill very well. I am honoured to start another year at Loyola serving our important mission with such an amazing team of educators.

CHRIS PHELAN '67, ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR

He then worked for Batshaw Juvenile Services at Marymount High School again working with young people who came from difficult backgrounds and circumstances to help them succeed at school and in the real world. He mentored many young people during this period and not only acted like a Big Brother (he still does to one or two) but also a 'man for others'. Chris was a director of the LHSAA for many years and served as the Secretary for six of those years. Having graduated

in 1967, Chris organized most of his class reunions over the years, most recently their 50th which was a great success. His



A Jesuit Influence: Excerpts from Loyola of Montreal: Stories from Our History by Jim Pearson

oyola's long and rich history was made possible by its many students and their families, educators and administrators, but most of all, the Jesuits. Jim Pearson's book, Loyola of Montreal: Stories from Our History, brings to life the people who helped shape our school's history including the Jesuits who helped form generations of 'Men for Others.' The following excerpts from Jim Pearson's book show the dedication of Loyola's Jesuits to both the students and the school.

Fr. Kenneth Casey S.J.

Fr. Casey took pride in rigorously administering the religious, moral, and intellectual discipline for which the Jesuits were renowned, but the welfare of students was a high-ranking priority. For



them, that meant becoming Christian gentlemen in the best sense of the word. He was tough but fair, and very sympathetic to any boy willing to give his all for Loyola and its ideals. Alumni from the late 1940s to the mid 1960s have fond memories of a rigid regime which strongly emphasized extra-curricular activities and school spirit. Fr. Casey was not only the force behind the exacting standards but also the High School's staunchest fan, seldom missing a drama presentation, a speech contest, a football, or hockey game.

Tom Pirelli '65 remembers the day of the football final in November 1964:


City Championship day, I was nervous and may not have been paying as much attention as one teacher desired. I ended up in Fr. Casey's office where he was about to deliver one of his patented blows to the hands when I reminded him that starting cornerbacks need soft hands to intercept passes.

Father Casey was a stern disciplinarian but also a practical man. He halted the strap in mid

swing and escorted me out of his office with the admonition that if I should drop a single ball during the game I would be back in his office the next day. Fortunately, we routed our opponents and I was relieved of my appointment with the "biffs."

Fr. Len Altilia S.J.

Another initiative taken early in Fr. Altilia's mandate, was to establish an advisory committee to study the possibility of a predominantly lay Board of Governors, which would act as a second tier in the administration of Loyola. It would report to the Jesuit Board of Directors in an advisory capacity for the moment, but it would also anticipate the possibility that Jesuit manpower might some day be unavailable to run the School. The committee met over a two-year period to prepare a mandate. On September 19, 1996, Fr. Altilia convened the initial meeting of the new Board of Governors representing the various components of the Loyola community.




Fr. Winston Rye S.J.

In 1985, the Loyola Jesuit Community welcomed a new Superior, Rev. J. Winston Rye, S.J., or, as he introduced himself: "Winston Rye - cigarettes and whiskey!" In addition to his responsibilities at

the Jesuit Residence, Fr. Rye returned to the High School History Department where he had taught in 1971. In 1988 he was named President of the High School to succeed Fr. Eric Maclean. Always a thorough planner, he earned the grudging admiration of teachers when he would announce at the opening faculty meetings that he had just completed his lesson plans for the full academic term. Basically a shy man, Fr. Rye inherited a situation where he had to leave his comfort zone to be responsible for the funding and implementation of the School's building program, and to become a visionary taking Loyola into its second century. This he tackled with enthusiasm.

In the words of Tony Parr '53, reporting in the Fall 1992 issue of Loyola Today:

Sharply at 10:30 a.m., under a canopy of clouds lowering but fearing to intrude on so splendid an occasion, members of the Bantam Football Team deployed at curb-side facing the main entrance to the new building. Each bearing one of Loyola's gorgeous school flags, they ranged aside those carrying the Canadian, Quebec and Papal flags.



Fr. Rye read a brief prayer, then passed the maroon book with its white cross to Bishop Leonard J. Crowley, an old friend of Loyola. The cornerstone was then laid in place and blessed by the Bishop.

The ceremony was as simple and superbly dignified as that. Peter Forlini '93 then bore the crucifix into the school followed by two candle bearers, Andrew Jones '95 and Joshua Parr '95. And then with Vatican magnificence, the flag-bearers bore in the National, Provincial, Papal, and Loyola colours, followed by the expectant crowd.


Fr. Eric Maclean S.J.

Fr. Maclean allied the School with the American Jesuit Secondary Education Association (J.S.E.A.), a group intent on re-establishing the thrust of Ignatian vision in a modern world. Following the

lead of J.S.E.A. writings, he formulated a *Statement of Identity* of the School's goals, thereby confirming Loyola as a Christian community of administrators, faculty, students, parents, alumni, and associates. He then invested in Loyola's future by sending teachers to J.S.E.A.-led colloquia in Guelph. Each colloquium concentrated on the positive influence of Jesuit education and the part Loyola's faculty had in its past and future development.

He had two characteristics which complemented his management abilities and proved helpful in rekindling the enthusiasm of a faculty tired of internal squabbling. He could laugh at himself, otherwise he would not have returned one day from saying Mass at a seniors' residence to report:

"In the middle of my sermon, an old woman shouted from the back of the room, 'This is boring. Somebody change the channel." And he loved a party. Friends on staff teased him, saying he would spend lavishly on a staff soirée, only to sift through the garbage the next morning to retrieve empties for the refund.




